Acting Locally, Growing Globally

In this issue of Sitenotes, we are having a closer look at two recently completed projects which contribute to South Australian manufacturing; SAGE Automation at Tonsley and Beerenberg in Hahndorf. Both projects show how technological change is re-shaping the way things are made, and how the design of these spaces facilitates these major transitions. It is encouraging to know that the work-life quality of staff is a key consideration of manufacturing design in this new high-tech era.

First up is the new SAGE office and workshop within the Tonsley high-tech manufacturing precinct. SAGE (you may have noticed their digital travel time road signs) previously had premises spread across multiple buildings and levels on a large site, which segregated activities and isolated staff depending on their department. One of the goals for their relocation was to integrate these departments and facilitate interaction between all staff to improve the office culture and sense of shared mission.

The new office was designed around an active central spine with open plan work areas on both sides. Staff interaction is facilitated through the provision of shared social activities within the central spine. These allow those who previously had no contact with each other to interact informally on a daily basis. In addition to points of contact within utility and meeting areas, for the first time, a staff kitchen and breakout zone was provided and has become the heart of the facility. The sense of distinct teams is maintained and concentrated within more formal work zones.

It has been a real joy for all involved to hear anecdotes of staff forming working relationships after interacting for the first time at the new Tonsley facility, despite having worked together for up to 20 years.

From Tonsley to Hahndorf; Beerenberg's sweet new processing centre completes the multi-stage design of their operations facility. Again, an emphasis was put on consolidating all activities within one manageable area while allowing for future growth.

The new facility hosts everything from boardrooms to boilers and houses an impressive collection of new state-of-the-art food production equipment, a warehouse distribution area, and office administration spaces. SPA collaborated with several process engineers and production experts to ensure that the new equipment could be utilised to its full potential.

The result is that Beerenberg has been able to double their production capacity and can now keep up with the increased demand resulting from their playful rebranding back in 2013. Interestingly this facility can now jam out 60,000 bottles of condiment in a shift, and one new production line can fill and label 120 iars every minute.
