#DEsignTOX. Building for Better Health

SPA has been designing for health for some time now, covering the full spectrum from research to diagnostics and treatment. Our work includes spaces for mental health, day clinics, hospitals, dialysis clinics, health research and other specialist facilities.

One such project we are particularly proud of is the UniSA Cancer Research Institute, which avid readers may recognise from previous Sitenotes issues. Now that it is complete and fully operational, we thought it fitting to look closer into the health-specific initiatives of the design.

The \$250M, 16 storey facility was generously granted the Kaurna name Purruna Wardli, meaning Healthy Place.

Ironically, several months of consultation and design were conducted in a window-less room within City East, far removed from the light-filled environments to come.

This consultation process also included interstate visits to some of the country's most successful laboratory facilities to understand, amongst other things, the balance between the practicalities of lab sterility and the human necessity for relatable work environments.

Our favourite anecdote of this balance is that of one scientist, whose work demands a completely artificial 12 hour day/night lighting cycle. This resulted in 15 years of research in rooms without natural light. Thanks to some smart control systems, the technical needs are now satisfied while being able to access one of the city's greatest views.

Change is always challenging and we were pleased to hear that another particularly sceptical researcher moved in within 12 hours of visiting the facility, despite having previously resisted relocation.

Collaboration is at the heart of the building, realised by working in close association with our client and project manager Christina Coleiro at UniSA and our Sydney-based design partner BVN Architecture, with input from a range of specialist consultants including lab design consultant Jeff Freeman.

The facility now hosts a mix of alliances between government and private enterprise and is home to the UniSA School of Pharmacy and Medical Sciences, the Centre for Cancer Biology, UniSA business incubation hub, the Innovation and Collaboration Centre and the MOD; a future-focused public museum. This makes the building home to the largest cohort of cancer researchers ever assembled in South Australia.

The building's first two levels are dedicated to free public gallery spaces and is definitely worth visiting. The Museum of Discovery is currently hosting MOD.IFY - an exhibition at the intersection of art, science and innovation. If machines harming each other is more your thing, Combat Robot Battles begin in early October.








New Office Progress
