The State of the Union (House)

To some of us during our Uni years, Union House was a strange and perhaps lonely building on campus. Sandwiched between an everincreasing range of new purpose-built buildings, it seemed that time was going to be called once and for all for this once-great red-brick and concrete testament to South Australian modernism.

A new lease of life dawned for the building with the decision to locate the Royal Croquet Club on the campus for the 2019 Fringe. We were pleased to be engaged initially in August 2018 to renew the landscaping around the Union Building, and developed a concept that reflected the strong linear elements of the heritage building while introducing carefully detailed contemporary elements and patterns.

The project steadily evolved to include a fully refurbished Mayo Refectory as the new UniBar, complete with stage seating and tables. A soft palette of matte greens and blackened steel effortlessly complements the heritage listed red-brick walls, natural concrete and timber.

Emboldened by progress achieved on site by Sarah Constructions, the project team extended the scope further to include an Exercise Studio refurbishment including a brand-new sprung timber floor, mirrored walls and ballet barre, intensifying activity both on and off site to a fever pitch that seemed unsurvivable.

Survive it we did and on opening night, shaded by the green leaves of the cloister trees and looking through the terracotta roofed cloisters, there was not a hint of the break-neck timeframe within which the project was conceived and executed.

Strangely, as is sometimes the case with heritage projects, it is testament to the quality of design that people who had used this building for years were not quite sure of what had changed but knew Union House was a place they wanted to be.
