Healthy Living

Medical facilities are a particularly satisfying aspect of our work. As well as involving very specific technical requirements they offer fascinating insights into the lives of the medical and allied professionals who serve us so well.

Operating theatres are a good example. As well as meeting stringent clinical and functional requirements the focus on these spaces is also to provide long views to the outside to provide relief for the team during operations. One of our recent projects is a major upgrade to the Insight Private Hospital in Albury where the theatres are particularly well provided for in this regard.

A particularly exciting project that is currently at the planning approval stage is the New Town Medical Centre in Hobart. The brief has evolved over three years through quite a number of iterations: testing the capacity of the site and planning constraints, responding to the requirements of a wide range of stakeholders, and evolving along with development of the business case.

A key feature of the design is use of large open floor plates to allow

complementary medical services to work in unison with one another on single levels and take advantage of common services and facilities.

The site was particularly challenging. Not only was there a height difference of over 10m across the site, it also contained deep uncontrolled contaminated fill! Our engineers had their hands full working up a detailed remediation strategy based on a comprehensive underground survey.

One of the key design objectives was to devise a building that is distinctive in its own right as well as addressing a transition between residential buildings on the north and mixed use buildings on the south. The solution is a composition of clean contemporary forms expressed using a range of materials reflecting the different characters of adjoining precincts.
