One current project that promises something along those lines is the rejuvenation of the Repatriation Hospital Precinct; the site previously included a surgical facility which is currently being demolished. It is rumoured to have included several underground operating theatres, which has us all intrigued.

However, that aside, we are fortunate to be the Architectural team for Nexus Hospitals, who will provide and operate a significant Hospital development in this precinct.

Still in the design process, the project is shaping up as a five storey Hospital that will have six operating theatres and supporting recovery beds for a range of medical procedures including orthopaedics, ophthalmology, gastroenterology and general surgery.

There will also be a number of Allied Health tenancies within the building with the provision of extensive undercover carparking for patient convenience.

The new Hospital and environs will be available to both public and private patients, increasing capacity for SA Health public patients on this site, and providing private patients access to state of the art medical facilities.

Our professional services will be provided in the disciplines of Architecture, Interior Design and Landscape Architecture, and along with other major Medical and Educational Projects, it will keep the office busy and productive with cutting edge projects for several years to come

Newer stuff, 'SAULT', older stuff 'Darondo'.






Sam beginning the Kudlila Rally
